OVERVIEW

Company Mission

Our company mission is to make it the norm for men and women from developed countries to live and work as volunteers in a developing country; they should work on projects which have a clearly favourable impact on host-communities. In this way, we will continue to create a multi-national community with a passion to serve and to inspire.

Care Programme Mission

Our Care programme mission is to provide sustainable educational support, care and protection to disadvantaged children and vulnerable groups to enhance their physical, social, emotional and cognitive development.

Background Information

India is signatory to the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC) since 1992 and has made some progress in promoting the rights of children. It has promulgated legislations against child labour practices and issues related to child trafficking. With the backdrop of UNCRC and Indian government initiatives, the Projects Abroad country specific mission is to focus on child development and protection.

The children we work with are aged 0-18 years, live in poverty, have learning disabilities or special needs, come from difficult circumstances or live with HIV/AIDS. The following needs have been identified for these children:

- Confidence level in children must be improved
- Children have to be respected and corporal punishment removed
- · Children's personal hygiene, nutrition and health must be improved
- Children need improved communication skills
- Children need extra stimulation activities

Partners

Projects Abroad works with various partners in Jaipur, India. Some of them are mentioned below:

- Jan Kala Sahitya Manch Sanstha (JKSMS) is a social organisation that has been working in rural and urban areas of Rajasthan State in India since 1983. They focus their efforts on social development, rehabilitation, protection and empowerment of children, women and the poorest members of society by promoting sustainable livelihood opportunities. These include various artisan skills and trades. The organisation believes in the universal right to dignity, as well as the right to survival and self-respect through opportunities for personal growth and development. They have a sheler for boys, and one for girls. Both are there to support runaways, children living on the streets, orphans, missing children, and those affected by natural disaster.
- Shrestha Street & Working children is an NGO working for the mainstreaming of street and
 working children in Jaipur. Every day, Shrestha collects children from the nearby slums in Prem
 Nagar and brings them to the Non-formal education centre where they are taught basic education,
 sports, arts and crafts. These children have never received education because they usually
 belong to the families who earn their living by begging. But Shrestha believes children should
 neither beg nor work.
- Disha Foundation is a resource centre for children with multiple disabilities. It is a non-profit voluntary organization that was started in 1995. Disha's vision is of a society with equal opportunities for all, and love and understanding of the need for providing opportunities for children with multiple disabilities. Its interventions range from education to support to training and rehabilitation. With its 'inclusive approach' it aims to facilitate specific action and practices that integrate and include people with disabilities in all areas of life.

GOALS

In order to work towards our Care programme mission, we have set the following goals to achieve in the placements where we send volunteers:

1) Improve English ***Priority goal***

Having a good understanding of English can vastly improve a child's chance of finding work opportunities when they reach adulthood. Volunteers improve the standard of English by creating reading clubs, learning aids and providing one-on-one support.

2) Promote early childhood development ***Priority goal***

Early childhood is the period from birth to eight years of age. It is critical to a child's cognitive, social, emotional and physical development. Early education and preschool programmes enhance children's language and maths test scores, behavioural skills and long-term educational attainments. Volunteers promote the four key areas of early childhood development (physical, social, emotional and learning) by designing visual and practical learning aids and workshops.

3) Improve hygiene levels of the children

Educating children about personal hygiene will improve their general health and wellbeing. Volunteers systematically monitor the environment at the care centres in order to identify areas for improvement. It usually just takes a systematic approach and some basic monitoring practices to improve the

hygiene standards. Making the environment they live or learn in more hygienic will also help to prevent sickness and therefore aid them in other areas of their development.

4) Increase emotional support and care to children

Many children in India grow up without one or both of their parents. They are often left at home or in institutions with little stimulation or company. Children without parental care are at a higher risk of discrimination, inadequate care and abuse.³ Volunteers increase emotional support by providing a platform for children to express themselves through workshops and games.

5) Improve the level of stimulation to each child

Many of the children in childcare are restricted to a small living space and do not have access to extracurricular activities. Volunteers improve the level of simulation to each child with planned creative activities that provide extra physical and mental exercises.
